MAKE SEATTLE'S GROWTH WORK FOR EVERYONE

As Seattle continues its unprecedented growth in both population and wealth, affordable housing production and investments in transportation are falling far short of the need. Housing and transportation crises undermine the collective benefits that economic growth should bring. Working people in our city are struggling to make it on incomes that are not keeping pace with some of the highest rental costs in the nation.

Seattle's more than 30,000 Uber and Lyft drivers – many of whom are immigrants and people of color for whom driving is their only source of income - lack minimum wage protections or paid sick leave, and bear all of the costs and risks associated with their jobs. 58% of gig economy workers can't even afford a \$400 emergency expense.¹

All people should live with dignity in safe, healthy, and affordable homes. Yet Seattle region needs 156,000 new affordable housing units to ensure that working people have the opportunity to live close to their jobs.²

Healthy and thriving communities need transit options and investments. After housing, transportation is the highest cost to families.³

Fortunately, Mayor Durkan has introduced a plan to leverage our city's growth and ensure essential worker protections while also tackling the two biggest cost burdens for low-wage households: housing and transportation.

Fare Share Seattle is a coalition of housing, transit, labor, social justice, environmental, health, and community organizations that have come together to support the Mayor's plan, and to make sure Seattle's growth is working for everyone.

Our Fare Share priorities are:

Guarantee that Uber and Lyft drivers have basic job protections and earn at least the Seattle minimum wage after expenses.

Ensure that ride hail companies are contributing to thriving, livable communities, by implementing a 51-cent tax on trips to fund affordable housing near transit and transit infrastructure improvements.
